


Sandor Schuman presents

Friday Evening: Lucky Numbers

Anything more would be anticlimactic. And yet we insist on concluding the service with one more song. But from all of Jewish liturgy, which can fit the bill? Of course, we conclude the

service with *Adon Olam*, but why? From all of the possible prayers, poems, and songs, why this one?
